If your child needs special care or attention, he or she can find it in our community. Online resources are at your fingertips at the Baltimore Jewish Abilities Alliance (BJAA). Educational support is available for students with learning disabilities at SHEMESH. And, children ages five to 13 can be included at Jewish camp with the Camp Milldale Inclusion Program.

Get help however you need it – whether it's to escape an abusive relationship (CHANA), to overcome an emotional trauma (Emotional Well-Being) or to get a loan for a new house (Homebuyer Loan Assistance).

After spending years volunteering with The Associated, Baltimore County natives Jon and Marni Yoffe stepped up their involvement with IMPACT – the couple will chair this year's Generosity Gala, celebrating the charity of IMPACT's donors. We spoke with Jon and discussed their involvement:

Q: What inspired you to get involved with IMPACT?

A: "We got involved with The Associated when I was in law school. I joined the YLC [Young Leadership Council] program, which was two years at the time, because I wanted to give back to my local Jewish community, and network with other like-minded young professionals. After completing the YLC program, I took a seat on the IMPACT Board, and Marni and I have been campaigning, planning and attending events ever since."

Q: What is one of your favorite aspects of IMPACT?

A: "Whether you're Reform, Orthodox or somewhere in between,

this organization is about promoting and supporting our community. There are many young people in the organization who are not that observant, but still feel a strong connection to this community and their roots. Q: What made you decide to chair this year's Generosity Gala?



The whole country saw it – Baltimore on fire. In spring 2015, after details of Freddie Gray's death surfaced, peaceful protests shifted to riots, shutting down our city – buildings caught fire, businesses were looted and neighborhoods were destroyed.

The need to do something was blatant. Watching it unfold, the **Baltimore Jewish Council (BJC)** was ready to act. "We already had the Interethnic and Interfaith Dialogue infrastructure in place," said Cailey Locklair Tolle, Deputy Executive Director at BJC. "These dialogues were formed to establish and maintain good relationships between the Jewish community and other ethnic and faith groups in the area."

"We're lucky because we were able to get together a Jewish African-American Dialogue very quickly," adds Madeline Barnett, Assistant Director of Community and Public Relations at BJC. "We sat down and said, 'How can we help?' because we didn't want to be rushing in and doing any programming or volunteering without hearing about what [the community] really needed."

Talking It Out


Although BJC staff helps with planning, covers social media and arranges guest speakers, the dialogues themselves are run by community leaders. There are one to two chairs per dialogue group, who "run the show," according to Madeline. The chairs facilitate the dialogue and ensure that people aren't "just listening to a lecture. It's very interactive."

The main goal? Building relationships. "There's a sense of 'otherness' that happens, especially in a city that does have these clear divides," explains Madeline. "People like being able to slowly build that trust, to talk about the issues and then to go out in the community and do something to fix it together."

It's been some time since your bar or bat mitzvah; now you're thinking about your child's. Thankfully, you've come to the right place for placing Jewish life into your family life. Through parenting, education and recreational programs to hands-on volunteering opportunities, join the collective community and learn, give back and get together with similar families.



Send Your Kids Off to Camp Worry-Free

When children spend their summers at a Jewish camp, they come home with so much more than a tan. After hours of nonstop fun and activity, they develop a deeper Jewish identity, a newfound independence and lifelong friendships.

The Jewish camp experience is different for each child – some kids are content to run off without a second glance back at home, others need more coaching and reassurance. Check out these tips from Amy Bram, director of Camp Milldale, to ensure both you and your child have a great summer:

Schedule a tour. Exploring the camp your child will attend in the summer is "crucial," according to Amy Bram, for you and for your child. Meet the directors, check out the grounds, ask questions! The more you can visualize a happy summer, the more likely it is to happen.

Read the given information. Camp professionals work hard to prepare the informational materials that are given to parents. Read the information *carefully* so you and your child understand the rules and expectations.

Complete the requested information. Camps typically ask parents to send information relevant to their child's behavior. At Milldale, there's a "Confidential Camper Profile" which gives the camp a sense of how your child behaves in certain situations – when your child is sad, in a new situation or in need of support. This piece is huge in ensuring the child's happiness at camp.

Help the camp help your child. One of the goals of camp is to help kids navigate the world without their parents – this includes guiding them through conflict. As parents, it's important to partner with camps to discover the source of the conflict, knowing that one child's account can be swayed in one way or another.

Be prepared. We understand that, some mornings, it's hard to get a four-year-old out the door, but there are steps you can take to prepare your child for the day. For example, if your child doesn't want to put on sneakers in the morning, but you know that sneakers are required for outdoor play, place the sneakers in your child's backpack. The camp and your child will thank you later!

Get excited! The more enthusiastic parents are about camp, the more likely it is that their kids will mimic their enthusiasm. "It's a rough and tumble world in summer camp," says Bram. Bumps and bruises – from sliding into first base or a morning nature hike – become a part of the camp experience. Celebrate them as badges of pride!

Shabbat Fun for the Whole Family!



Shabbat is a beautiful time in a Jewish home. Some families light candles, others share a meal and some just make time after a hectic week to enjoy each other's company. The sounds, the smells and the traditions make Shabbat special.

There are so many objects associated with Shabbat. Some of these items include a *challah*, a *challah* cover, candles, candlesticks and a Kiddush cup/goblet. To keep these special objects together, create a Shabbat box. Encourage children to decorate this box and make some of the contents by hand. Some families might keep special games that they play on Shabbat in their Shabbat box, while others might keep Judaic items and prayers. It's really up to you!

SHABBAT BOX:

Your box can be made of plastic or cardboard, can be covered in glitter or fabric or can be decorated with markers and crayons. Here are a few steps to get you started on creating your own Shabbat box:

- 1. Decide what should go inside so you know the size box you need.
- 2. Pick out the box. Don't forget a lid!
- Create a design for the box. Should the inside as well as the outside be decorated? A trip to the Macks CJE REmida Project to find all the embellishments you need might be in order.
- 4. Use your hands! Bake *challah* with your family or dip your own candles. Find an old glass in the cupboard and get some permanent markers and decorate it for a Kiddush cup.

VolunTeam Up!

In April 2013, after spending a morning at a one-time volunteering event, Dov Hoffman wasn't content to just pack up and leave: **"I thought, 'This was great. Now, let's do more."**

Dov decided to take his volunteering commitment further by setting up an ongoing opportunity for other interested young adults. Initially partnering with other organizations in the community, he arranged quarterly volunteer mornings with Moveable Feast, an organization that provides people suffering from HIV/AIDS and cancer with free, nutritious meals. Soon, the group attracted a regular following, so they decided to form their own VolunTeam.

An initiative by Jewish Volunteer Connection (JVC), a VolunTeam creates an opportunity for ongoing volunteering for a group of friends, family members or coworkers. Dov chose Moveable Feast because of JVC's recommendation: "The work of Moveable Feast aligns perfectly with JVC's mission to fulfill critical needs within the community."

The biggest benefit of a VolunTeam is flexibility – an important factor for young professionals. "Other volunteer opportunities may be only during the week or during work hours, but [the VolunTeam model] allows us to work with the volunteers' schedules," explains Dov.

Starting a VolunTeam also opens the doors for relationshipbuilding within the community. Dov adds: "It brings together people who wouldn't otherwise cross paths or who are new to Baltimore. People who say, 'How can I devote my time to serve the community?' can meet other like-minded people."

With the Moveable Feast VolunTeam, participants are able to see the impact that their volunteer work makes – even on just a quarterly basis. "When we go, we're preparing meals for Moveable Feast to deliver," explains Dov. "We bring in between 12 to 15 of us on a Sunday morning for a few hours, and we can put together more than 1,000 meals for those in need."

Dov's motivation to give back? It's simple: "What drives me to volunteer is knowing that, by just putting a little bit of my time somewhere, I'm helping other people. That's it."



Things You Didn't Know About Jewish Baltimore

1. Baltimore is home to the oldest synagogue in Maryland, which is also the third oldest standing synagogue in the United States: the Lloyd Street Synagogue. Built in 1845, it originally housed Baltimore Hebrew Congregation, which was founded in 1830. (The other two buildings? Touro Synagogue in Providence, RI, built in 1763 and Congregation Kahal Kadosh

> Beth Elohim in Charleston, SC, built in 1840.)

- 2. The origin of the national Jewish Community Center movement dates back to 1854, when the first social organization for young Jews, the Hebrew Young Men's Literary Association, was founded in Baltimore.
- 3. The Port of Baltimore was the second busiest point of entry (after Ellis Island, NY) for European immigrants in the 19th century. Steamship lines partnered with the B&O Railroad to provide combination tickets, allowing those who wished to head west to disembark at Locust Point and get right on the railroad.



Introducing: Jewish Professional Women

Do you want to network with other career-minded woman? Are you interested in enhancing your professional skills? Thinking about making a career change? No matter what career stage you're in, Jewish Professional Women provides opportunities for women to network, socialize and learn together.

We spoke with four of the co-chairs of this initiative: **Elizabeth Green**, a partner with Pessin Katz Law; **Ellen Katz**, who runs the day-to-day operations of a global Healthcare Market Research company; **Sandi Moffet**, strategic advisor at Brown Advisory; and **Laura Rubenstein**, a Prinicipal at Offit Kurman, P.A.

Q: How did you get started on your chosen career path?

A: Elizabeth Green: When I was 16 years old, I was speaking with my father's cousin about what I was interested in. He suggested that I should become a lawyer. From that moment forward, my path was pretty direct.

Ellen Katz: My undergraduate degree was in healthcare policy and, after college, I went to work for a healthcare company whose clients were pharmaceutical, biotech and device companies.

Sandi Moffet: Upon graduating law school, I took a job in the Trust department of a local bank and began my career working with clients and their outside advisors on tax, estate, charitable and multi-generational planning issues.

Laura Rubenstein: I always wanted to be a lawyer and had some influential professors in law school who introduced me to the practice of management-side employment law.

Q: What inspired you to get involved as co-chairs of JPW?

A: EG: I want to help women to feel that there are other women going through the same experiences who can understand the pulls of life as a professional, a mother, a wife and even as a daughter.

EK: [It was a] desire to get more involved with The Associated while also having the opportunity to connect with like-minded women in the community. I worked remotely so all of my colleagues are in other cities ... and I am looking for a vehicle through which to connect to other professionals in the local community.

LR: I was honored to be asked to co-lead this group alongside very intelligent, successful professional women.

Q: What is your hope for the Jewish Professional Women's group?

A: EG: I hope that women will feel that they are able to get something of value from the group. For me, that value would be a feeling that they are not alone as well as a deeper list of "go-to" people for referrals, questions and other things.

EK: [I'd like to see] Jewish professional women, working in a number of different industries, coming together to engage in networking activities ... as well as to hopefully develop lasting professional and personal relationships.

LR: [I hope] to provide a comfortable place where professional women can feel connected and accepted, despite their full schedules.

Q: What type of programming should women expect from JPW?

A: EG: We have learned that there are as many different interests as there are women involved. We hope to have some networking, some Jewish learning, some professional education.

LR: That's what's so great about this group. We have the ability to offer different programs that would interest professional women in our community. While we know we won't please everyone, we plan to hold social events, scholarly programming, networking opportunities, and jointly host events with other community groups to maximize opportunities.

Q: Why should women be excited about this program? What will set it apart?

A: EK: It is the only program targeted specifically at Jewish women professionals who are established in their careers.

While there will be a networking component to the group, its scope is broader and will provide professional women with an opportunity to interact with one another in a broader array of activities. Women can pick and choose which events are of interest to them.

SM: [It's] an opportunity for women to engage who are committed professionally and personally to their work, families and giving back to the community.

LR: It's the opportunity to be around other like-minded successful women who may be challenged by the same issues and to make long-term connections.

Q:Now, looking back to your first job, what advice would you give yourself?

A:EG: My first job was as a law clerk in the Baltimore City Circuit Court. I was so new to the working world that I didn't even know what questions to ask. I wish that I had been able to understand what an experience I was getting and had been more inquisitive ... I think that I could have capitalized on some of the experiences better.

EK: If the opportunity seems right, go for it. After college I went to work for company that was unknown ... [it] was the best company I have worked for in my career!


SM: Stay committed to what you want to achieve.

Ruth Sapperstein was always the kind of person who did volunteer work. So, when she moved to Baltimore from New York in 2009, she thought, *Okay, what am I going to do here?* "I took a walk and I saw the CHAI office. I walked in, and I volunteered." It was the beginning of a beautiful relationship. Two years later, the idea was brought up to start a "village" – a supportive petwork that through volunteers and paid staff

supportive network that, through volunteers and paid staff, helps older adults access transportation, health and wellness programs, home repairs, social and educational activities and other day-to-day needs. As a senior herself, Ruth was interested from the start: "We all sat down, put our heads together and figured out what we wanted." This village became **Northwest Neighbors Connecting** (NNC), a program of CHAI: Comprehensive Housing Assistance, Inc., and a self-sustaining community network of interdependent, diverse and caring individuals who give and receive services that help them age in place and enhance their physical and emotional wellbeing. These services include: maintenance, such as check-in calls and emergency preparedness support; enrichment through social events and leadership development; and organization through monthly meetings and need-based committees. Members can give back by helping in the NNC office, driving other seniors and making household fixes. Ruth's favorite perk of NNC is the **Northwest Shuttle Service** (NWSS). Since she doesn't drive, Ruth takes the shuttle bus to go grocery shopping on Mondays and Thursdays. Drivers are there to assist the seniors with their packages. "I can't talk enough about these wonderful drivers. They treat us seniors beautifully," she says, adding: "It really is a lifesaver. Otherwise, how would I go shopping?"

Meet Atara Reich

There was a time when Bais Yaakov eighth grader, Atara Reich, a bright student with executive functioning disorder (EFD) needed three lockers to store all of the "trash" she had accumulated at school.

"One locker was for my art projects, one was for paper – junk I didn't feel like sorting through -- and the other was for my school books. I couldn't find anything!" Atara had trouble concentrating, organizing herself, completing assignments in a timely fashion and managing her anxiety. Parents, Estie and Reuven Reich feared that despite their daughter's intellectual gifts, she wouldn't succeed in school.

"Atara is a brilliant, absent-minded professor-type. She loves art and creative writing. She is gifted and she is very disorganized," says her mother, Estie Reich. "I'm scatterbrained," agrees Atara.

Atara's father Reuven Reich recalls that from preschool on, his daughter's teachers liked her and recognized her intelligence and talents. But sometimes, he admits, they were frustrated by the obstacles her EFD presented.

As she got older, the stakes got higher. "I realized that as gifted as she was, Atara would not be able to compensate for her disorganization as her school work became more challenging," says Estie Reich.

Fortunately, things changed for the better when Atara met Sarah Ottensoser of SHEMESH, a community-wide program of The Associated that provides intellectual, academic, emotional and social support to Jewish students with learning differences. Since Atara was in the sixth grade, Ottensoser has provided weekly executive functioning coaching to her at Bais Yaakov.



Through SHEMESH, Ottensoser works one-on-one with Atara, teaching her organization and time management skills, as well as techniques to control school-related anxiety. "I don't know what I would do without her," says Atara. "I was drowning in paper and Mrs. Ottensoser threw me a life raft!"

Atara takes pride in the improvements she has made since she and Ottensoser first began their work together. "We are officially done with binder organization," she says. "And now, I am mostly getting things done on time."

"It's a tremendous gift," says Estie Reich. "Atara is in highest level reading, math and Hebrew classes, but if it were not for her work with Mrs. Ottensoser, I don't think she would have remained in them. Mrs. Ottensoser is so positive and energetic. Atara really responds well to her," she continues. "We are so grateful. This would not have happened without Mrs. Ottensoser and SHEMESH."

Perfect your resumé. Your resumé

is the first thing recruiters see, and, typically, you only have six seconds to make an impression. Keep it clean, be consistent with format, choose a simple font and, most important, proofread. The bullet points should call attention to your most noteworthy professional accomplishments.

Join LinkedIn. Ninety-three percent of employers use LinkedIn to investigate candidates, so this social media service is a *must* for all professionals. If you're applying for jobs in the marketing or social media realm, the same goes for Facebook, Twitter and Instagram – an online presence on those sites is relevant.

Google yourself. See what shows up online when you enter your name since some employers screen out candidates based on what they find online. When possible, remove any objectionable material about you (like those pictures from your earlier years).

Research the company. If you don't already know, do some digging on what is important to the company. The salary and benefits may be nice, but if you

don't think you will fit with the corporate culture, it probably isn't the best job to pursue.

Do a practice interview. In an interview, you may be asked tough questions. Ask a family member or friend to roleplay with you by staging an interview and asking some of these difficult questions. (Typical questions include: "Tell me about yourself," "What's your greatest weakness?,""Why did you leave your last job?" and "Where do you see yourself in five years?")

Look the part. Even if you're applying to a low-key startup, it's important to dress professionally. Be sure to smile – organizations look for warm, enthusiastic candidates to move to the next level.

Sell yourself. Tell the prospective employers exactly why you are the perfect choice for their company. Give examples about how you're a valuable employee or how you went above and beyond what was required of you.

If one person is being held captive, then we are all suffering.

No organization believes this more than **CHANA**, the Jewish community's response to the needs of people who experience abuse and trauma.

For the past 20 years, CHANA has helped men, women and children feel safe, and Executive Director Nancy Aiken has facilitated this work for the past 15 years.

CHANA's growth is something that fills both Nancy and the community with pride: "When the program started, it was a group of community leaders saying, we want to say 'no more' to domestic violence," said Nancy. "We've expanded our mission to provide services for survivors of sexual abuse and, most recently, seniors who experience domestic violence or elder abuse involving family members."

This fall, CHANA celebrates its 20th anniversary with a series of events: first, a film presentation of the critically-acclaimed documentary, Crime After Crime, the story of attorney Joshua Safran's efforts to free a domestic violence victim from jail; next, a celebration with Safran as the keynote

speaker; and, lastly, a breakfast with Safran, lawyers and other professionals in the community.

Safran's journey was of particular interest to Nancy. "He was an attorney, but he didn't have any specific knowledge of this area of the law – he was just willing to put in his time," she explains. "He thought, 'Well, I have to help this woman, not even though I am a Jew, but because I am a Jew."

With this in mind, Nancy asserts that anyone can be an advocate. "The more we understand the dynamics between victim and perpetrator, the more we talk about it without shame and guilt – the more likely it is for people who experience abuse to come forward," she says, adding: "I think that it's such a strong message for our community to hear that, even though [Safran] has become guite a strong advocate, when he started, he was just a Jewish person who cared about others."
